A message from the Headteacher - Mrs Mulholland

School life has truly mirrored the arrival of spring, with so many wonderful activities and opportunities taking place across the last few weeks. We enjoyed an amazing World Book Day, filled with reading activities and a beautiful costume parade. This was followed by an engaging Science Week, led by Miss Collins, which included live lessons and exciting lunchtime science activities throughout the week. The children also took part in the NSPCC's Speak Out, Stay Safe workshops and assemblies, helping them to understand how to keep themselves safe.

In addition, we were delighted to see our first school trip of the season, with Year 3 and Year 4 visiting Ufton Court to take part in practical workshops to support their learning on Ancient Egypt, an enriching experience for all involved.

As we move through the term, a few important reminders. All children with hair that touches their shoulders must have it tied back securely at all times during the school day. Following the Easter break, summer uniform will be optional until half-term and then compulsory thereafter. Summer dresses should be worn with white socks (not tights), and grey shorts with grey or white socks. Black shorts may be worn underneath dresses for modesty, but they must not be longer than the skirt. Polo shirts can be worn by all classes (no ties required). The only exception is Year 6, who may choose to remain in winter uniform until they leave in July. A reminder also that PE shorts must be an appropriate length, coming down to the knee. If you have any questions about uniform, please do speak to the school office or your child's class teacher.

We are very much looking forward to our Holy Week celebrations in school next week, beginning with Year 1 and Year 2 leading us on Tuesday. This is always a special and reflective time in our school calendar.

As we approach the end of term, we wish all our families a joyful and peaceful Easter break when it arrives.

We also ask that you continue to keep Fr Danny in your prayers and we all wish him well with his treatment programme and hope to see him back in school soon.

Finally, please remember to keep Saturday 9th May free for our Jubilee Community Day. We have lots of wonderful activities planned, including a whole school Jubilee Art Exhibition in the hall, which will be open for that day only. We warmly invite all members of our wider school community—former pupils, parents, staff, governors, and friends of the school—to join us for this special celebration. Please do help us spread the word!

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SMC Nursery



What a wonderful and busy half term we have had in Nursery!

One of our themes has been reading Traditional Tales, and the children have thoroughly enjoyed exploring the stories The Three Billy Goats Gruff and Jack and the Beanstalk. Through these stories, the children have taken part in lots of exciting activities including storytelling, small world play, and role play. It has been lovely to see them retelling the stories in their own words and acting out the different characters.

Inspired by Jack and the Beanstalk, the children have also been growing and caring for their own bean plants. They have taken great pride in watering them and checking on them each day, watching carefully to see how much they have grown. It has been a fantastic way for the children to begin to understand how plants grow and what they need to stay healthy.

The children have also enjoyed creative activities, experimenting with paints to see what new colours they could create and expressing themselves through their artwork. Through our story The Three Billy Goats Gruff, the children explored the language of big, medium and small, comparing the different goats and using these words confidently in their play. While learning about Jack and the Beanstalk, we also talked about height, noticing how the beanstalk grows taller and taller.

One of the highlights this half term was World Book Day, where we held our very first Nursery parade. The children looked amazing in their costumes and were so excited to show them to their friends and later on to all the parents. It was a wonderful way to celebrate our love of stories and books.

We also loved welcoming families to our Mother's Day assembly. The children worked very hard practising and were so proud to perform. It was a very special moment for everyone involved.

We are incredibly proud of all the children. Their confidence continues to grow, and it has been wonderful to see them becoming more independent, enthusiastic and willing to have a go at new things.

We have learnt about the life cycle of a butterfly as part of Science Week. We have been reading The Very Hungry Caterpillar, which the children have loved, and they are very excited because we have our own caterpillars in Nursery! Over the coming weeks we will be watching them carefully as they grow and eventually transform into butterflies. Once they are ready, we will release them together.

During Lent, we have also been thinking about how we can be kind, thoughtful and helpful to others, and the children have done a wonderful job showing care and consideration for their friends.

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Reception



This month in EYFS has been full of exciting new learning experiences, curiosity, and hands-on exploration!

We were thrilled to begin our computing sessions using the iPads. The children have shown great confidence and independence in learning how to log in and navigate their way around Purple Mash. They are now able to select activities and are developing important early digital skills such as using touch controls, making choices, and exploring different programs.

Our topic of growth and life cycles has captured the children's imagination. We have been learning about how living things grow and change over time. The children each planted their own beans and have been carefully looking after them, learning what plants need to grow, such as water, sunlight, and care. It has been wonderful to see their excitement as they observe changes day by day.

A particular highlight has been our classroom caterpillars! The children have been fascinated watching them grow and are eagerly anticipating the next stage of their transformation. This has helped bring our learning about the butterfly life cycle to life in a very real and memorable way.

In Drawing Club, we have been enjoying the story *The Very Hungry Caterpillar*. The children have been using their creativity and imagination to think about different foods the caterpillar might eat and what it might turn into. We have seen some fantastic ideas and storytelling, alongside developing drawing and early writing skills.

It has been a joyful and engaging month, and we are very proud of how the children have embraced new challenges and experiences. Thank you for your continued support!

Year 1



Year 1 have had a busy time. In English we have started a new unit called *The Candy House*, based on the classic tale of Hansel and Gretel. The children have enjoyed our early morning activities based on this story and loved making their own candy houses to eat. This is leading to some lovely writing. In history we have been learning about Famous nurses, and have been very interested in the lives of Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole. In music we have been exploring pitch, tempo and dynamics using glockenspiels. In geography we have been thinking about how we can encourage more plant life in our school grounds. In RSHE we are learning about people who help us and how important it is to know who is a safe person to look for, our name and address in case we ever get lost.





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Year 2



It is a bittersweet week, as we say 'goodbye' to our wonderful student teacher, Ms. Seager. We have all loved having her in Year 2 and will miss her energy and kindness dearly. We wish her the very best as she heads off to her next adventure and her own class to teach next year!

Over the last few weeks, our Year 2 historians have been stepping into the shoes of Charles Darwin. In English, we wrote vivid diary entries describing the exotic creatures he discovered on his travels. This beautifully linked to our History focus on world-changers, where we've been comparing Darwin's discoveries to the moon landing of Neil Armstrong. In art, we have been exploring the magic of the colour wheel! After mastering primary and secondary colours, we looked at the vibrant, flowing landscapes of artist Ted Harrison. The children are now using his style to influence their own independent paintings.

Whilst in Maths, we have become experts at precision. We discovered how to line up our rulers starting at 0 to measure objects accurately in centimetres (cm) and metres (m). We also moved on to weighing, learning how to read scales to work out the mass of different objects using grams (g) and kilograms (kg). It was great to see the children estimating first and then finding the exact weight!

We have been having lots of fun discovering seasonings, choosing and mixing ingredients, preparing and cooking potato wedges and avocado dip in DT. The children were very excited to then taste test their creations. We will now use this lesson to inspire our writing, as we move on to instruction texts in English.





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Year 3



Year 3 have had an exciting and very busy few weeks, filled with memorable experiences including World Book Day, British Science Week, and our fantastic school trip. The children have shown wonderful enthusiasm and energy throughout all of these special events.

We had an absolutely fantastic time on our recent trip to Ufton Court, where the children were able to experience Ancient Egypt in a fun and memorable way. It was a wonderful day filled with learning, drama, and exciting hands-on activities.

One of the first highlights was the Embalming and Mummification workshop. The children learned how Egyptian beliefs influenced everyday life and why preserving the body was so important. They explored the different stages of the mummification process and took part in a dramatic procession, helping to bring the ceremony to life. The class also learned about canopic jars and why they were used, as well as the important role of the High Priestess during the ceremony. It was a fascinating and memorable experience that really helped the children understand Ancient Egyptian beliefs.

Another activity was the Crime and Punishment session, where the children explored the key question: What happens to law breakers in Ancient Egypt? Through a lively drama workshop, the class acted out how the Egyptians dispensed justice and learned about the consequences people faced if they broke the law. The children were fully engaged and really enjoyed taking part in the role-play activities.

We also took part in the Book of the Dead workshop, where the children discovered how Ancient Egyptians believed they reached the afterlife. Through a fun and interactive game, they learned about the challenges Egyptians thought people faced on their journey and why the Book of the Dead was so important.

It was a brilliant day full of excitement, curiosity, and memorable experiences. The children showed fantastic behaviour, enthusiasm, and teamwork throughout the visit, and we were incredibly proud of them. What a wonderful way to bring our Ancient Egypt topic to life!





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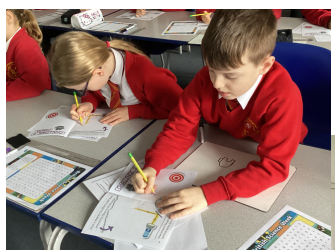
Year 4

Year 4 have worked really hard in the recent weeks. In Art, they have been developing their artistic skills this term, creating detailed sketches and enhancing them with watercolour to add depth and effect. They have particularly enjoyed exploring mixed media, using a range of materials to bring their artwork to life as well as evaluating their work on how to make it even better. In D.T, they have built their sewing skills in designing, and sewing a book bag. They will use the backstitch to sew their designed book bags next week.

In P.E. children celebrated resilience and reflected upon how important team work is, so that they can take on bigger challenges and be more resilient sports people.

In English, the children have been focusing on instruction writing, learning to use specific language features effectively. They have now begun their next piece of writing—an explanation text based on the digestive system—which they are approaching with great enthusiasm.

In Maths, pupils have worked hard to strengthen their understanding of fractions and have shown the importance of fluency in their times tables. We have now moved on to learning about decimals, where they are continuing to build confidence and accuracy.



The recent trip to Ufton Court was a highlight of the term. The children thoroughly enjoyed taking part in a variety of engaging and hands-on activities, learning about the Book of the Dead, Crime and Punishment and the Embalming and Mummification as part of Egyptian beliefs.

Additionally, as part of Science week, pupils became scientists as they explored the fascinating world of chromatography. Using simple materials, the children investigated how different colours can be separated into their individual components. Thinking deeper as to which pen would be the best to take to Space, given the microgravity there.

Through hands-on experiments, they discovered how water can carry colours across paper, revealing hidden shades within everyday inks. The class made predictions, observed carefully, and discussed their findings like true investigators. It was wonderful to see such curiosity, enthusiasm, and teamwork as the children developed their scientific skills. A fantastic week of learning and discovery!

In R.E, we have reached the end of our R.E. unit, the children have reflected thoughtfully on Jesus' teachings, including parables and the Beatitudes, and have considered how these can be applied in their daily lives.

Well done to all of Year 4 for their continued hard work and positive attitude to learning. Keep up the great work Yr4!!!



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Year 5



It truly has been a term filled with so many wonderful activities and memorable learning experiences. Following on from our NSPCC work, we were fortunate to take part in a fantastic workshop based on Childline and how to keep safe. The children were given a range of realistic scenarios and encouraged to think carefully about how they might respond, who they could turn to for help, and the importance of speaking out. It was incredibly valuable in building their confidence and understanding around personal safety and wellbeing. It has also been lovely to see the children choosing a wider and more adventurous selection of books following our World Book Day celebrations. This growing enthusiasm for reading is already having a positive impact, helping them to explore different writing styles, expand their vocabulary, and develop their own creativity in writing. In RE, we have been learning about change and how we can better ourselves. Linking this to the season of Lent, we explored Siedah Garrett's 'Man in the Mirror' and carefully unpicked the lyrics to reflect on how its message applies to our own lives today. The children then worked collaboratively in groups to plan thoughtful reflections, which they will be sharing over the coming weeks.

We also thoroughly enjoyed Science Week, where we carried out a chromatography investigation. Using different coloured pens and tissue paper, the children observed how water travels through the paper, separating the inks into the individual colours that make them up. This introduced them to the scientific concept of mixtures and how substances can be separated based on their properties, sparking lots of curiosity and thoughtful discussion.

To round off the term, we were delighted to welcome Scott and his team from the Royal Berkshire Fire Service into our school. They spoke to the children about fire safety, including how to create effective escape plans, what to do in an emergency, and how to stay calm in potentially dangerous situations. The children even had the exciting opportunity to sit inside a fire engine and explore the specialist equipment, helping to bring this important learning to life in a memorable and engaging way. It has been a fantastic term, and Mrs Tomlin and I are incredibly proud of the children for the effort, determination, and resilience they have shown, especially during their end-of-term assessments. They have grown not only academically but also in confidence and maturity. It has been a real privilege to watch them support one another, embrace new challenges, and continue to shine.





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Year 6

The last few weeks have been extremely busy for Year 6 and they have worked incredibly hard.

In Maths we have worked on making links between fractions, decimals and percentages. The children have learnt the common equivalents of these three types of number e.g. $0.75 = 75/100 = 75\%$. By consolidating their knowledge of place value within decimals, they can now convert all types of number to its equivalent.

In English, we finished our setting descriptions of the fictional town Oddly-on-Sea with some good pieces of descriptive writing that include adverbials of place, descriptive language and in some examples of similes and metaphors. Our focus in English then moved to embedding speech into a narrative. In narratives, the use of speech needs to advance the action and convey characteristics of the person speaking. As a stimulus for our speech narrative, we watched a short clip from 'The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe' focussing on the part where the children need to enter an air raid shelter to evade the bombs in London. All the children have taken on board how they should embed speech, and we now just need to focus on ensuring that they punctuate it accurately.

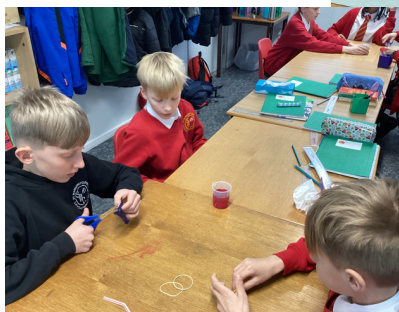
Our current English and Science topics are aligned as we are working on understanding how our Circulatory system works. In Science we made models of the heart to see how it pumps blood around our bodies. Once we have all of the knowledge of how the system works, we will create an explanation text in English.

In RE, our focus has been on understanding the three pillars of Lent and the impact this has on our lives today. The children discussed which one of the Pillars they believe to be the most important and the class were divided between: praying as this brings you closer to God and almsgiving as this provides things for people who do not have enough. It would be interesting to compare your thoughts with those of your children.

In music, Year 6 has been exploring the powerful role of music during World War II. We've compared these songs to the marching "call to arms" tunes of WWI, noting a shift toward sentimental ballads that focused on longing for home and the resilience of the Home Front. A particular highlight has been learning "The White Cliffs of Dover." The children have explored the message of peace and optimism, even mastering the vocals! It has been moving to hear them bring this classic anthem of hope to life in the classroom.

In geography we have been tackling the big questions surrounding sustainability in the UK. We've been exploring how we balance our modern lifestyle with the health of the planet, specifically looking at the impact of our farming, how we generate green energy, and the ways we manage our water supply. One of our favourite highlights was diving into the world of tech to see what's actually inside our gadgets.

This led to a very messy (and very fun) "Cookie Mining" experiment. Using nothing but toothpicks and chocolate chip cookies, the students tried their hand at extracting "rare earth elements" without crumbling the surrounding environment. It was a fantastic—and eye-opening—way to see just how difficult and destructive mining can be, sparking some brilliant debates about why recycling our old electronics is so important.





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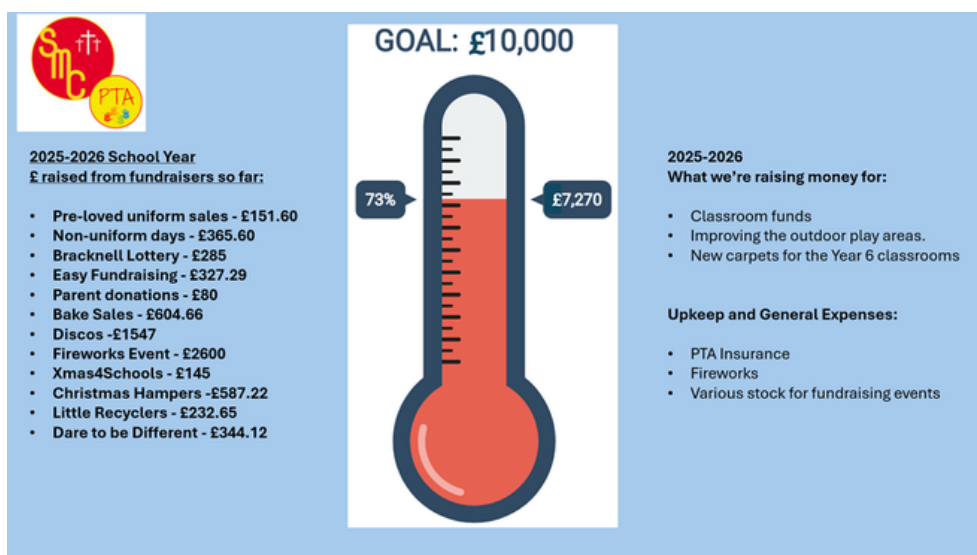
